When speaking to children about 'home' they were much more interested in talking about other people's homes, especially weird and wonderful homes such as igloos, ships and castles, and imagining what these places are like to live in and explore.

Taking this on board, we decided to make *Home* a show that transports the audience to strange and wonderful new worlds. Children interact with the show as props enter the audience and the set expands to envelop the entire theatre.

Home embodies all that we believe in at Patch: placing children at the centre of the performance and inviting them to actively participate in the creative journey.



How about a time when opening a door felt a little bit scary? Did it turn out okay?


Write an imaginative poem beginning with this line: 'I opened the magical door and saw...'

Imagine you are opening the door and walking through.



Our snail is a gateway into our imagination, it opens portals once we begin to play.

Snail Science

Prompts for further inquiry

Snails are one of the only asymmetrical animals! Learn about <u>Jeremy the Lefty</u> Snail... Why was Jeremy special? What did scientists learn from Jeremy?

For such a small creature, snails can live for a long time. Some species can survive for 15-25 years.

In very hot, dry or cold conditions, snails can seal up their shells and sleep for up to three years!

The Giant African Snail is the size of a kitten and sometimes kept as a pet.

Slugs and snails are gastropods – this means 'stomach foot'.

Snails are also related to squid, cuttlefish and octopus.

Tread carefully... many species of snails are endangered (though others are invasive).









Pipe Cleaner Snails

Transform your finger into a snail and explore the world from a new perspective. Then experiment with different objects to create a shell for your snail!

Fun fact: when Charlie beat five personal bests in the swimming pool he celebrated by eating KFC. Even elite athletes are allowed some treats!




Meet Zoë


